### HIS WORD TODAY

"There are different gifts but the same Spirit; there are different ministries but the same Lord; there are different works but the same God who accomplishes all of them in everyone. To each person the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good."

As members of a vibrant church community it is easy to recognize the giftedness of so many people. Our worship comes alive through the commitment of readers, musicians. Our education efforts for adults and children reflect the firm faith of others, ready to transmit what they believe. The outreach to those in need continues to be an expression of Christ's love for others, through the pantry or hospital visits. The person who welcomed you at the door of the Church made you feel welcome..

## EVANGELIZATION MINISTRY

### The Conversion of the Apostle, St. Paul, January 25<sup>th</sup>

St. Paul was born in Tarsus in the Roman province of Cilicia. Originally his name was Saul, and he was a Jew of the Tribe of Benjamin. However, he also possessed Roman citizenship. Saul was raised as a Pharisee, and he studied Latin and Greek.

At some time, he was sent to Jerusalem and studied at the feet of Gamaliel the famed rabbi (Acts 22:3). With this excellent education and scriptural knowledge, he is considered the most erudite and learned figure in the early Church.

Saul first encountered the faith several years after the crucifixion of Jesus by which time the Church had been established in the Holy City. Paul was an enemy of creed and present at the martyrdom of St. Stephen in the year 36. Saul consented to Stephen's death and held the clothes of those who stoned Stephen to death (Acts 7:58-8:1)

One day on a journey to Damascus to arrest Christians, Saul received his famed conversion through the theological encounter with the light. He then understood that Jesus whom those he persecuted worshipped was God. Blinded by the light, Saul was taken to Damascus where he was baptized by Aronias through the imposition of hands. Then he accepted the spiritual and intellectual challenge offered to him by God who restored his sight. Later, he changed his name to Paul. Paul spent many years in Arabia in prayer and meditation, after which he returned to Damascus and began preaching the faith. Paul met St. Peter in Jerusalem where he spoke boldly in the name of the Lord, and then he went to Caesarea and Cilicia (Acts 9:30). Several years later, about the year 45, Paul, Barnabas and Mark set out on the first of three missionary journeys. Later Mark left, and Paul assumed leadership. Paul preached and founded Christian communities everywhere he went. He preached initially in the Synagogues but devoted most of his effort to converting the Gentiles who were greatly receptive to his words.

St. Paul, who was once a persecutor of Christians, after his conversion, played a colossal role in the formation of Christian theology. His letters cover approximately one-third of the New Testament and are generally the second reading at most Masses. His theology encompasses issues such as faith, grace, the Holy Spirit, predestination, free will, the Eucharist, and baptism.

The Knights will be having a membership blitz to attract new members before and after all Masses the weekend of January 30<sup>th</sup>.

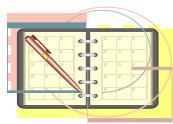

## Water Into Wine



I try to find time to read the newspaper every day. It is a good way to keep up with what is happening in the world around us. Have you ever thought about being a newspaper reporter when you grow up? Just think! If you were a sports reporter, you would get to go to all of the sports events. Not only that, you would get in free get paid for going! If you were a news reporter, you could just walk around town and see what was going on, then you would write a news story about it.

I thought it would be fun to take our Bible lesson today and re-write it as if I were a reporter writing an article in a daily newspaper. The story is actually from the gospel of John, but the word gospel means "good news," so let's imagine that we are reading an article from the "Daily Galilean" or perhaps "The Jerusalem Times."

Wow! Listen to this headline! "Wedding guest turns water into wine."

Hmmm...That sounds interesting. Let's read the rest of the story! On Tuesday, a woman named Mary was in Cana to attend a wedding. A large number of guests, including her son, a man named Jesus, also attended the wedding. Guests at the wedding were reportedly having a good time until the host ran out of wine. At that point, it seemed that the happy celebration might turn into a disaster.

Some of the wedding guests thought that perhaps Jesus might have a solution to the problem, so they reported to him that they were out of wine. When told about the problem, Jesus at first seemed unwilling to do anything, but after some encouragement from his mother, he finally agreed to help.

Eye witnesses at the wedding reported that Jesus noticed several large water jars nearby and instructed some servants to fill them with water. After the jars had been filled with water, he told them to dip some of the water out of the jars and take it to the man who was in charge of serving the wine. When the wine steward tasted the water, he discovered that the water had been turned into wine.

Wedding guests were amazed at the turn of events and said that the wine was the best that they had ever tasted.

As a result of this miraculous event, many people are following Jesus everywhere he goes, and many believe that he might even be the long-awaited Messiah.

Well, that made a pretty good news story, didn't it? Do you know what is really great about this story?
